25 YEARS OF THE FRIENDSHIP PROJECT

Over the past 25 years, many people have worked incredibly hard to make the Friendship Project for Children the success it is today. In this special anniversary year it is appropriate to pick out just a few of those who have made significant contributions to the Project and highlight some of the important events that have taken place in that time.

Tribute must be paid to the Project founder and our first Chairman, Charles Raeburn who saw the 'Big Brother' Big Sister' organisation working in America and recognised the need for something similar here in Warwickshire. In 1986 the Friendship Project was established as a charity, at that time operating only in Warwick. Pam Daniel was the first Project Coordinator, from 1987-2002. Pam worked with Charles Raeburn, helping him to develop many of the procedures for recruiting Older Friends.

John Vallis, former County Engineer, was involved with the Project from the early days. He made a significant contribution as coordinator of fundraising and also had spells as Chair and Vice Chairman.

In 1992 there were 38 Friendships and the new role of Group Supporter was first introduced; their role being to guide a small number of Older Friends and monitor their Friendships. This remains a vital role within the Project in assisting Area Coordinators.

During the 1990's the Project had a flourishing branch at the University of Warwick. Each year between 30 and 50 students befriended young people in different parts of Coventry. The student's activities were ably coordinated by Peter Muckersie and Val Gough, retired head and deputy head of Castle Sixth Form Centre in Kenilworth. Occasionally, students from both Coventry and Warwick Universities do still apply to become Older Friends.

1993 saw a new branch being set up in Stratford upon Avon with Ruth Beesley as the first branch coordinator. The following year a branch in Rugby was established .

In 2000 the Nuneaton and Atherstone branches were established: Maureen Quinn being the first Coordinator for Nuneaton and Johanne Rutter who took over from Carol France and Pat Falkner in 2001 for the Atherstone branch. Then finally in 2007 the Southam branch was established.

We are immensely proud that Helen Yendall, a highly talented local poet, is a former Older Friend. Her poem 'A Child in the Corner' typifies the plight of many Younger Friends.

Over a number of years Dr Vic Tuck has worked with current Chairman John Hancock as consultant on Child Protection issues. Likewise Martin Cliff has been an important link with Children's (formerly Social) Services and we are grateful to Vic and Martin for their ongoing support.

In 25 years there have been many changes: Barry Aust took over from John Leary to develop the role of Operations Manager. He also acted as fundraiser for a year unearthing new funders. In 2006, Pete Aldersley joined the Project as Operations Manager and was an Older Friend for a time. Pete created Xanadu, the Project database and maintained it until realising that the Operations job had grown so much that another new post of Project Administrator was needed, this being created in 2007.

Sadly in 2009, Treasurer Roy Edwards died. IT specialist Chris Buck joined the Project and introduced expense payments to Older Friends by electronic transfer, a great improvement to payment by cheque. Chris has recently stepped down as Treasurer and is now looking after the Project website.

Needing a new Treasurer and a new Funding Officer following the death of Carol Morton last year, Alan Marshall happened to be in the right place at the right time and is now making his mark in both roles. Alan is working with John Hancock and the Area Coordinators, both ably assisted by their respective husbands, to find new funders and making funding applications.

The six branches have come together into two areas, each having its Area Coordinator who works closely with CRB and Briefing Officers: Lynne Ballantyne and Pauline Higginbottom for Southam, Warwick and Stratford branches and Lois Hamson and Judy Sims for Atherstone, Nuneaton and Rugby branches.

Two other people deserve a mention in this brief tribute on the Project's 25th Anniversary, they are Michael Coker our President and Cheryll Rawbone the Project Secretary. Both have been with the Project since it all began back in 1986 (and neither look old enough!).

John Hancock. became Chairman in 2004. His sheer passion for the Project drives the rest of the management team to build on the work of the past 25 years. He has stepped in to help out in differing roles when needed; he has acted as Treasurer, Fundraiser and Area Coordinator, he is now continuing in helping to raise funds, he is the Child Protection Officer and also a Group Supporter. In 2007, John produced a booklet to mark the 21st anniversary of the Project. In 2011 he is hoping to be a proper Chairman!

The Project management team come from many different backgrounds, but all share the desire to help as many of the needy children in the county as possible. All of them work tirelessly to do their job, from sending out application forms, interviewing applicants, arranging Matches - the tasks are endless.

Today, Group Supporters, the links between Older Friends and Area Coordinators, play a vital role in the smooth running of the Project, supporting approximately 65 Older Friends who generously volunteer some of their time each week to a vulnerable child. *Together we are making a difference—Ed.*

Helen Yendall is a former Older Friend and writes:

I first met Sam* when he was twelve and until he was seventeen I took him out every weekend. He's now almost twenty-three and we are still in touch.

Sam has learning disabilities and he's not academic: reading and writing have always been a struggle. But he's got plenty of common sense and he's a polite and sensitive lad, who gets on with people.

As a child, his family didn't have much money, or a car, so treats and outings were few and far between.

From the start, I wanted to give him experiences that he might not otherwise have had. I wanted to see him grow in confidence and realise that he was just as good as anyone else.

We had lots of 'adventures' together, including many 'firsts': his first time strawberry picking, conker collecting, blackberry picking, water sliding, playing badminton, ice skating and tobogganing at the Snowdome. Even the simplest activity was fun: like flying a kite in the park.

We suffered the torment of watching his local team lose most of their football matches (and occasionally the jubilation when they won!) and he has certainly made me laugh. As the eldest child though (I am one myself!), he can be a worrier, so I have always tried to defuse his worries and encouraged him to be carefree and to enjoy his youth.

He certainly always enjoyed our trips. I used to pick him up in my car and before we'd even fastened his seatbelt, he'd ask, "What are we going to do *next* week?!"

During our friendship, *Sam* spent 3 years at a residential training college, after school, where he had some great experiences (eg: trips overseas and to his beloved Manchester United). He took it all in his stride – partly, I hope, due to the attitude I have tried to instil in him of taking every opportunity life throws at you.

He now has his own council flat and his first girlfriend. He's still close to his family and although he doesn't currently have a job (he has some medical problems which don't help with that), he's such a hardworking lad – who likes to earn money – that I don't think it will be long before he finds something that suits him.

Whenever I see him — which is just a few times a year now, although we text and phone too - he's always pleased to see me. "I've missed you," he tells me. "Have you missed me?" I like to think that I've been one of the constants in his life; someone who hasn't let him down, someone who's always tried to let him be himself. I am sure we will always be in touch and I hope that one day, if he has a family of his own, that he will be the kind of father who, remembering some of the 'adventures' we had, will enjoy spending time with his children - even if it's just flying a kite in the park.

Chantelle is an 11 year old young girl who has been befriended by one of our adult volunteers for the last 2 years.

When she was originally referred to our Project, she was a sad, shy, quiet little girl, lacking in self-confidence, and she had difficulty in socialising and sustaining relationships because of her inability to express her feelings in an acceptable way.

The following letter, in exactly her own words, was recently received from her and speaks for itself:

Dear Lois

Since I've known Linda I've become a more happier girl. Also I have got on more with my Mum and Dad and I have been concentrating on my family more. I have also met some of Linda's family, and they are really nice to me and they are really friendly.

And now I also know if you work hard and concentrate you will become a happy girl, because you will know what to do and you will also get high marks.

Now I am a happy girl, me and my friends haven't fell out so much, and also I've have made new friends at my different school.

Since I've knew Linda for 2 years we have done lots of things together, my favourite things are Drayton Manor, cinema, swimming, baking cakes, snakes and ladders, meeting people in Linda's family, and also meeting Linda, Doug and Stanley and also William.

From Chantelle



When I first met Chantelle (over two years ago now, unbelievably!) my over-riding feeling was that she was an unhappy little girl. Her relationship with her father was not good, and she was having problems at school due to disagreement with her peers. Being the oldest of four children, her mother had very little time to even consider what difficulties Chantelle might be experiencing.

We soon developed a rapport and I found Chantelle very easy to please – she was enjoying 'one-to-one' for possibly the first time.

Chantelle had a few friends who were a bad influence but she is now part of a group of nice girls, those who aren't pushing the boundaries but just enjoy playing together. I receive regular updates on their activities.

Gradually I believe that she has seen that it is possible to have disagreements with friends and siblings which don't lead to fisticuffs! There are other ways to deal with differences of opinion and even accept that you disagree!

I must say that a positive role model had been her former head teacher at her primary school – it meant a lot to Chantelle that he was the instigator of our Friendship and always took the trouble to ask how we were doing.

From Chetwynd Junior School, Nuneaton:

I am writing in response to your letter. Chantelle was identified through initial teacher concern, and then through the CAF process was referred to The Friendship Project

She was a child who benefited immediately from the support of your charity. The simple link of a 'trusting friend' was invaluable - her anxiety in school was noticeably diminished when she had somebody 'on her side'.

The relationship with the head teacher (Mr Roy Garner) and his support, alongside the Project, definitely had an impact upon Chantelle.

Intervention was just at the right time for Chantelle, and it is lovely to hear that the Friendship has continued.

May I add the Head Teacher's appreciation to your group for the work which you have done with Chantelle.
